Lakeland Leads Florida With a "200" Club

For several years we have read in the Torch: U.S. of the many one hundred chapters which are presenting themselves to the N.J.C.L. Florida, however, has much to be thankful for as Lakeland High School has presented two hundred and two FJCL members for national recognition. Only two other states can boast of a two hundred club [Virginia and Michigan].

Unique, however, is Florida's rigid requirement of "taking or having taken one year of a classical language" as a prerequisite to FJCL membership. Many states enroll classical mythology students and those who are truly interested in the perpetuity of classical studies as JCL members. This broadening of the membership requirements came about at the 1977 National Latin Convention held at Florida State University; Florida voted against this amendment and still adheres to a stricter interpretation of the Constitution.

Lakeland High has a unique and versatile sponsor Marcia Stille. Mrs. Stille has held several offices in the Classical Association of Florida and the Florida Foreign Language Association. She co-hosted the 1978 State Latin Forum and has attended several National Fora.

Mrs. Stille has taken on the challenge with the help of the club's officers--Sharon Buccino, President; Charles Spong, Vice-President; Deborah Buccino, Secretary/Publicity Chairman; Tom Perica, Treasurer; Ann Harris, Ways and Means Chairman; and Elizabeth Jenkins, Historian.

This year the club celebrated the Roman way with their annual pizza party; twenty-five pizzas and fifty quart bottles of soft drinks were consumed.

It takes a lot of money to feed 200 mouths, so the club began the year with a fund raising drive. Members sold 'Get Naught-y' bumper stickers and buttons. In addition to making \$300 dollars, the club helped promote school spirit. Members also served their school by providing a feast for the teachers on Teacher Appreciation Day.

Nationals 1982 in Oklahoma

The 1971 National Latin Forum brought Florida J.C.L.er's to the University of Oklahoma at Norman under the direction of Miss Vivia Craig, Florida's first State Chairperson. The 1982 National Forum will bring Florida's classicists again to the Home of the Cowboy Hall of Fame and the Oklahoma Sooners.

The convention will begin on Sunday, August 1 and will run through Friday noon, August 6. Nearly twelve hundred students and teachers are being planned for and one hundred of them will be from the Sunshine State. The convention will cost one hundred thirty dollars; this includes

all meals from Sunday evening through Friday noon, lodging and all convention expenses.

Registration packets will be available at the 1982 State Latin Forum for fiteen dollars. These may be obtained by any sponsor or student from Mr. Gilpin, our present State Chairperson. The balance of one hundred-fifteen dollars must be mailed to Miami University in Oxford, Ohio by June 1. No late registrations will be accepted.

For the student who would like to enjoy some JCL fellowship, Mr. Gilpin has planned a short tour to and from Oklahoma. The tour will include

two nights in New Orleans and a special half day tour of the New Orleans Museum of Art which is exhibiting 'The Search for Alexander'. The students will enjoy a half day at Six Flags over Texas on the return trip as well as a visit to historic Baton Rouge. Florida delegates wishing to go on the tour should contact Mr. Gilpin in writing at 2310 35th Street West, Bradenton, FL 33505. Prices are not set due to the tariffs which continually change as oil prices fluctuate. The tour is scheduled to leave Florida on Wednesday, July 28 and to return on Monday, August 9.

New Latin Course



New Latin Textbooks

Latin teachers of Florida, are you planning to order new Latin books? The 1982 adoption of foreign language text books was officially accepted by the State Board of Education on March 1 in Tallahassee. Mr. Gilpin is happy to report that three submissions will appear in the 1982 textbook informational guide and these will remain adopted for six years. The three are Latin for Americans, Books I - III; Our Latin Heritage, Books I and II and Books I through IV of the Jenney text. Any other text which you would like must be ordered via the individual school's flexibility funds [discretionary funds] designated for unadopted textbooks.

This was a very good year for foreign language textbooks and especially for Latin. It is not too early, however, to encourage publishers of Greek and other Latin books to consider a submission for the 1988 adoption.


