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ON RUNNING FOR FJCL OFFICE BY GARY BAKER - FJCL PARLIAMENTARIAN

If you have any inkling to run for elected state office (President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Parliamentarian, Historian, and Technology Coordinator), now is the time for decisions. Being an FJCL officer is not a job to be taken lightly. For much of the year you will have very little to do, but there will be times when you will have a great amount to do. If you can attend Nationals, love spirit, have the support of both your teacher and your parents really love Latin and the JCL, and have a skill that will serve you in office, you might be perfect!

Deciding what to run for (the most important part):

- The president should have a great deal of leadership experience.
- A vice president should have some leadership experience, and be very spirited.
- The Technology Coordinator should have experience with computers and some of the various internet languages, HTML especially.
- The historian should have experience with scrapbooking.
- The parliamentarian should have a basic understanding of parliamentary law, a knowledge of the state and national constitutions, and a copy of *Robert's Rules*.
- The recording secretary should know how to take minutes well.

Getting ready:

- You will need a Declaration of Candidacy form from the Ludi Packet which your teacher received. This must be filled out *completely* and returned to your teacher by the deadline.
- Regardless of your office, you should read through the state constitution and familiarize yourself with *all* the procedures of this organization and the campaign regulations that you got with your form, as violations may result in losing some of your campaign materials. If your teacher does not have one, you can get one by emailing me.
- You will need to buy materials (within the \$25 limit) and prepare them, and write your two speeches (for those who like being prepared). Keep your receipts, as you will not be permitted to display campaign materials without such and count all donated items a full value!

At Forum:

- You must give a thirty (30) second speech to the assembly, followed by receiving instructions about where campaign materials can be placed. Make sure you have your receipts.
- Actively campaign. Go out and talk to people, make sure they know your views and your experience.
- Friday evening you will have to give a sixty (60) second speech (90 for presidential candidates) at the Open Forum.


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FSV PROF€SSOR G€TS TOP HONORS

Every year, the American Philological Association recognizes the best teachers of classics in the nation. This year, one of Florida's own, Dr. Laurel Fulkerson from FSU, was granted the APA award for Excellence in Teaching at the Collegiate level.

Dr. Fulkerson has taught many of your current Latin teachers, including Mr. Bebergal (FSUS), Mr. Satriano



Many of the omniscient, omnipresent, omnipotent SCL also owe their super-Latin powers to her. She is the Yoda to many an Obi-wan Kenobi, bringing to life authors such as Plautus, Ovid, Vergil as Well as Greek authors like Plato.

Her most recent book, "The Ovidian Heroine as Author: Reading, Writing, and Community in the Heroides," was published by Cambridge University Press (2005). Its subject, the Heroides, was a collection of 15 poems presented as though written by a selection of aggrieved heroines of Greek and Roman mythology, addressing their heroic lovers who have in some way mistreated, neglected or abandoned them.

For those who are not bound for degrees in Classics, her course on Gender and Society in Antiquity is a favorite among the entire undergraduate population. Her charisma and enjoyment of teaching shine forth and bring the topic alive.

Dr. Fulkerson and the other professors of her caliber are the reason why so many classicists chooses to stay in Florida to receive their education and training.

Congratulations, Dr. Fulkerson, for your accomplishment. Keep doing what you do so well.
